Fulbright Distinguished Chairs Program

Program Overview: Awards in the Fulbright Distinguished Chairs Program are viewed as among the most prestigious appointments in the Fulbright Scholar Program. Candidates should have a prominent record of scholarly accomplishment. The former two-tiered application process for the Distinguished Chairs Program has been consolidated into a single application process. The new application deadline will be August 1, 2008. Applicants should submit a single complete application online that includes: the online application form with all required items completed; a project statement (up to five pages); a tailored curriculum vitae or resume, including publications list (up to eight pages); for research awards: a select bibliography (up to three pages) and three reference letters; for lecturing or lecturing/research awards: a course syllabi (up to 10 pages), two reference letters and one teaching report; a letter of invitation or other relevant correspondence from abroad, in the few cases where applicable. Selected scholars will be notified following a review during the fall.

FULBRIGHT-AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL UNIVERSITY (ANU) DISTINGUISHED CHAIR IN AMERICAN POLITICAL SCIENCE (AUSTRALIA)

Award #9001

Category: Distinguished Research

Grant Activity: Conduct collaborative research at the host institution and guest lectures or seminars at advanced undergraduate and postgraduate levels. Participate in a national tour with guest presentations at three to four institutions across Australia. Other activities as negotiated with the host university.

Specialization(s): Political thought, comparative politics, government, federalism, foreign policy, international relations (including security), presidential policy, or any relevant political science subfield

Grant Activity: Contribute to the Institute's active academic exchange in weekly seminars with other researchers at the Institute and to facilitate the Institute's research networking with U.S. universities and research environments. Participate in conferences and other activities organized by the Institute. Give at least one public lecture within field of expertise. Guest lectures at other Danish universities may also be arranged. The Chair is a joint venture between the Danish Institute for International Studies (DIIS) and the Danish Institute for Human Rights (DIHR), which—together with a common library and administration—constitute the Danish Centre for International Studies and Human Rights (DCISM). Specialization(s): The Chair is expected to have a strong track record of research within one or more of the Institute's research areas. Research at the Institute is organized in about a dozen research units based on a research theme rather than on academic disciplines, but cross-cutting research is encouraged—also with the research department at the Danish Institute for Human Rights. The research areas of the center are: constitutional law and human rights, migration law, nationality law, history and human rights, religion and human rights, punishment, prisons and human rights, the Millennium Development Goals, human rights and business, legal pluralism and challenges to the human rights environment, security and human

Category: Lecturing/Research

Grant Activity: Teach two courses per semester at the B.A. and M.A. level. At the undergraduate level, courses taught are within the fields of American history, introduction to cultural theories, race and ethnicity, popular culture, U.S. markets and business development and American politics. At the graduate level, courses change every year, but fall within the same broad categories: history, politics, cultural identities and markets. The teaching load is 6 hours per week each term. The format is a mix of seminars, lectures, discussions, presentations and oral reports. The average course size varies according to level: graduate courses usually have 15 students, and undergraduate level classes have a maximum of 35 students. Students purchase their own books, which may be supplemented by handouts scanned and placed on an internal computer network. Provide thesis

advising for graduate students and advise on curriculum development.

Specialization(s): Economic history and/or business history; regional and/or hemispheric integration (e.g. NAFTA or FTAA); trade policy.

Additional Qualifications: Ph.D. and 3 years of teaching experience required. Associate or full professors preferred; however, professionals will also be considered if they have the appropriate educational background. Publishing activities within given field.

Location(s): Center for the Study of the Americas, Copenhagen Business School, Copenhagen

Length of Grant: 10 months

Comments: The Center would like to involve the Fulbright Scholar in the education of its Ph.D. students of which there are currently two (e.g. as co-counselors on their current projects). There are also possible research opportunities. The Center is currently involved in a number of interdisciplinary research projects that should result in three book publications within the next year. Other projects are in the pipeline, and the Chair would be invited to participate in these projects as well as a number of conferences and seminars the Center organizes each year. The Chair will have easy access to a wide range of electronic journals, the university library and the Royal Library. Therefore, it will be possible to continue working on major projects, especially if the recipient is in the writing stage. The scholar will be given an e-mail address and will have access to a ADSL-connection at work and at home. Office space is provided. Some secretarial assistance is available. The university library is fully computerized and books can be ordered from any computer. In addition, American journals are available in full text format through any computer within the university network. The Business School has a highly developed technology infrastructure making it possible to use PowerPoint, Internet, etc. in all classrooms and lecture halls. The Business School has TV and video set-ups that can play American videos and DVDs. Housing will be found for the scholar and decided upon after consultation with the scholar.
