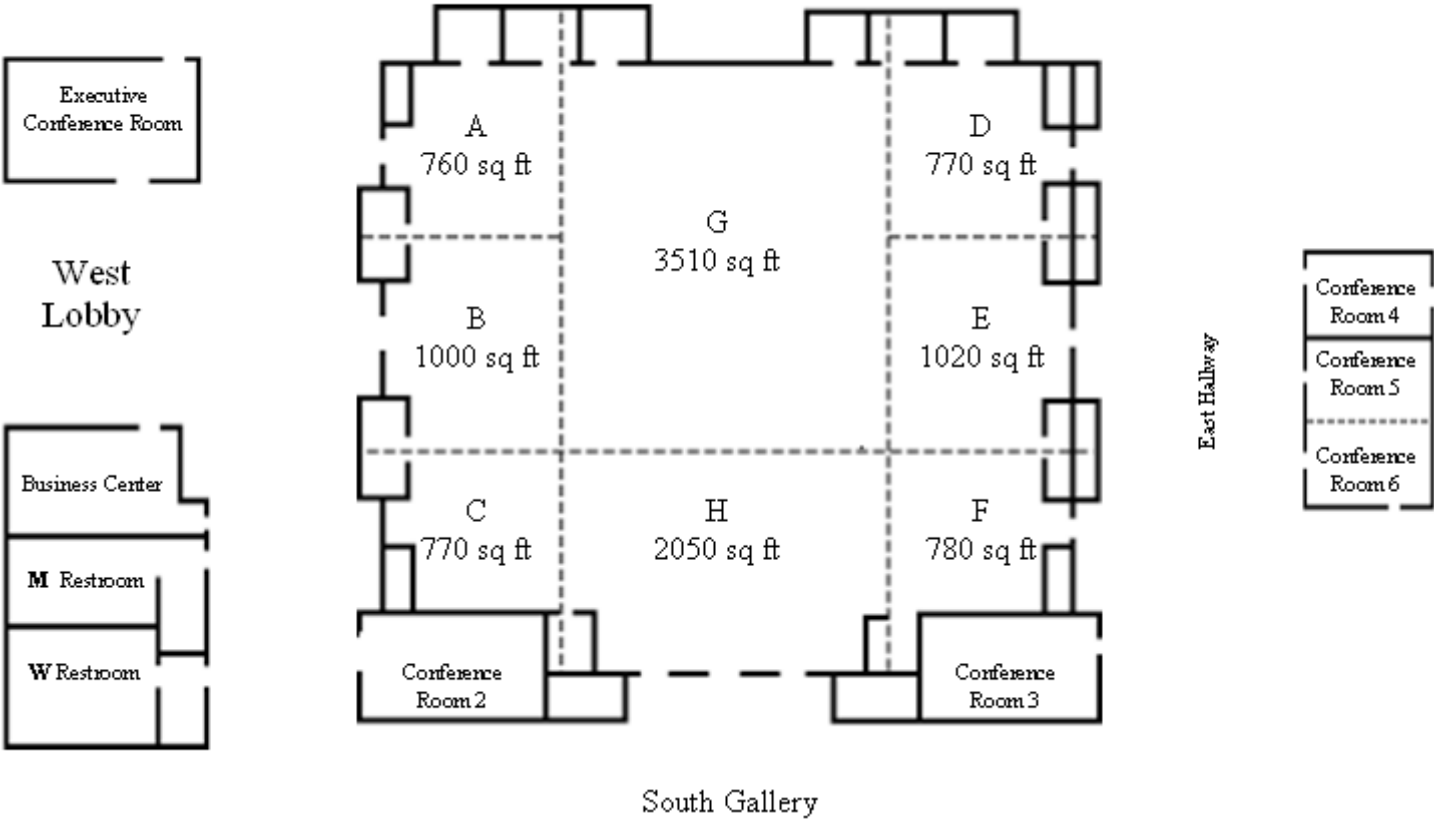

In remarks to the Class of 2007 at Trinity Washington University, President McGuire said *“‘Civic engagement’ is a phrase that a number of commentators use today in discussing the ends of education. Some decry what they perceive as a loss of the spirit of civic engagement on college campuses. They are wrong. On college and university campuses throughout this nation, the spirit and practice of civic engagement are forcefully present in service learning programs and political action groups across the spectrum of beliefs and loyalties. Here at Trinity, civic engagement is one of the most powerful threads in our learning paradigm, because the whole point of this*

education is to make you a confident, powerful public leader in whatever forums you are called to engage — a classroom, a courtroom, an operating room, a board room, a congressional caucus, a white house situation room, a living room surrounded by family and friends. Trinity women have inhabited all of those rooms throughout the past century, and in this new millennium, you will take the moral power of Trinity civic engagement even further than any prior generation has dared to go.”

Biographies of Speakers & Conference Organizers

Jane L. Anderson, CAE. As Executive Director of the Fulbright Association, Jane L. Anderson has worked with Fulbright alumni volunteers throughout the world and provided professional leadership in launching the J. William Fulbright Prize for International Understanding, the Fulbright Lifetime Achievement Medals, and the Selma Jeanne Cohen Fund for International Scholarship on Dance, an endowed lecture on dance scholarship. She led planning and implementation of the Fulbright Association's 31st Annual Conference in Beijing (2008), an event designated as one of the official activities marking the 30th anniversary of the normalization of diplomatic relations between China and the United States. Before joining the Association, she was Assistant Director of Lutheran Resources Commission, Washington, D.C. A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Michigan, Ms. Anderson has undergraduate degrees in French and in journalism and a master's degree in linguistics. She studied in France on a University of Michigan undergraduate program. She has earned the Certified Association Executive designation from the American Society of Association Executives. Her writing has been published in the *Miami Herald*, the *Chicago Sun Times*, and Knight-Ridder newspapers and in *Associations Now*.

Elizabeth Babcock is the Coordinator of the Talloires Network, an international network of universities promoting civic engagement and social responsibility in higher education (www.tufts.edu/talloiresnetwork) that is housed at Innovations in Civic Participation in Washington, DC. She directs the outreach, information-sharing and strategic planning for member universities and the governing body of the network. Previously, she was the Executive Director of the Civic Knowledge Project at the University of Chicago, working to increase quality educational and cultural programming and knowledge exchange between the University and its neighboring communities. In this position, she worked on an asset mapping project of community cultural organizations funded by the MacArthur Foundation, leading to the creation of a new university-based support network for these organizations. Elizabeth holds an M.A. in Latin American Studies from the University of Chicago and a B.A. in Anthropology from the University of Florida. She has co-authored several articles and publications, including a best practices handbook on adolescent participation in Latin America and the Caribbean for UNICEF.

Edwin Bodensiek is Director of Outreach and Public Affairs for the Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES), a division of the Institute of International Education (IIE). Ed joined CIES in October of 2008 from the President's Council on Financial Literacy at the U.S. Department of the Treasury, where as Director of Outreach he helped manage the council and a commission of 20 federal agencies. Before his appointment to Treasury, Ed served as a Communications Director at The Johns Hopkins University, where he specialized in bioethics. He has also worked as Vice President for Government Relations and Director of Public Affairs for Junior Achievement Worldwide.

Virginia Broaddus is Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Trinity Washington University. She joined the Trinity community in 2006 as Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs. Broaddus earned her B.A. degree with a major in English from Davidson College in North Carolina and received her M.A. from North Carolina State University. She completed her Ph.D. in English at West Virginia University. Broaddus has broad experience as a teacher, scholar, administrator, fundraiser and mentor to other faculty. She has worked in collegiate admissions and financial aid, supervised student services, coordinated an honors program, developed curricula, managed budgets, planned facilities, created articulation agreements, helped to shape accreditation reports, implemented assessment plans and implemented Moodle, the online course management and learning platform. Before coming to Trinity, Broaddus was a faculty member, program coordinator, and then Chief Academic Officer at Garrett College in western Maryland.

Michele Bowie is Dean of Student Services at Trinity Washington University. She has been at Trinity for 13 years. She earned her bachelor's degree from Southern Illinois University. She then returned to New York and became a member of the Brazilian Dance Company and performed in the Broadway musical "Hair" in 1980. She taught high school at Central Visual and Performing Arts High school for eight years and then came to Washington, D.C., to Howard University to work with federally-funded Trio programs. She coordinates several service-learning programs at Trinity.

Brittany Budden is the Interim Director of the Center for Service Learning at Howard Community College (HCC) in Columbia, Maryland where she is responsible for the college's curricular and co-curricular service learning program. Ms. Budden works with HCC faculty members to implement service learning in their classes and maintains over 100 community partnerships with organizations in the Baltimore/Washington metropolitan area. Prior to this position, Ms. Budden was the coordinator of student activities and leadership at Carroll Community College where she used service learning as a catalyst to develop student leaders. Currently, Ms. Budden is a principal researcher in a multi-institutional study of student motivation regarding involvement in co-curricular service learning, leadership and social programming opportunities.

Anthony J. (Tony) Cancelosi was appointed President and CEO of Columbia Lighthouse for the Blind (CLB) in September 2005. Under his leadership, CLB is refocusing its priorities to better serve the needs of the nearly 180,000 residents living in Maryland, D.C., and Virginia who are blind or visually impaired. To accomplish this goal, Mr. Cancelosi is expanding CLB's strategic partnerships within the greater Washington, D.C. metropolitan area and forging alliances with other blindness and disability organizations, both regionally and nationally. As CLB increases the depth and outreach of its local programs, Mr. Cancelosi is working to identify and cultivate new sources of private and government funding, reduce administrative expenses, and bring an increased level of fiscal accountability to the organization.

Mr. Cancelosi comes to CLB with extensive executive experience. Prior to joining the nonprofit organization, he was President of ICL, an international software company, and the CEO of several for-profit technology companies, including iBrite, Inc.; eStara; and Source Digital. He also served as COO for Kee Systems (now Sylvan Learning). Early in his career, Mr. Cancelosi worked in sales for Control Data Corporation. His nonprofit experience includes involvement with the International Center for the Disabled, National Kidney Foundation, and the Special Olympics. He is the former chairman of ServiceSource and is now a trustee of the ServiceSource Foundation.

In addition to serving on CLB's board of directors, Mr. Cancelosi serves on the Board of Directors of VISTA Technology Services, Inc. and is President Emeritus of the Association for Corporate Growth. He is a member of the Wharton Club, Leadership of Greater Washington Class of 2007, the Potomac Officers Club, and the Rotary Club. Mr. Cancelosi completed the Executive Finance Program at the Wharton School of Business in Philadelphia and received a bachelor of science degree in business administration from St. Joseph's University, also in Philadelphia.

Christine Djondo has recently returned to the Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES) at the Institute of International Education (IIE) to work on Fulbright Visiting Scholar Enrichment programs. She served as a Country Director for the US Peace Corps from 2001 – 2009 in Mozambique, Tanzania, Gabon and Lesotho. Prior to going to Africa she worked at CIES with the senior Fulbright Scholar Program where she assisted with internationalization efforts of Historically-Black, Hispanic-Serving, Tribal and community colleges and universities as well as serving as Program Officer for Africa Senior Fulbright Scholar Programs for five years. She held positions for two USAID training contracts; IIE's Global Training for Development (GTD) and Egypt Development Training II (DT2) projects and served as Assistant Director for Education Abroad at Ohio University, where she started a student service-learning program in Ghana. She served as the Virginia Co-Chair to the National Summit on Africa, as

NAFSA: Association of International Educator's Co-Chair for their Special Interest Group on Africa and as NAFSA's Ohio representative. Christine also served as an editor of an edition of *African Issues*, a journal of the African Studies Association, on Study Abroad in Africa. Christine has also made numerous public presentations in all her positions and has presented papers at international conferences in both the US and South Africa. She served as a Peace Corps Volunteer and Trainer in Cameroon where she stayed for four years in the 1980s. She holds an M.A. in International Affairs–African Studies from Ohio University, a B.S. in Human Development/Family Relations from the University of Connecticut and an Associate Degrees in Accounting/Business Administration.

Debra Egan serves as Director of Scholar Programs at the Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES). Dr. SchWeber has held two Fulbright Specialist awards: one is Israel in 2002 and the other in Namibia in 2005. In each of these countries she worked with faculty and students on ways to integrate technology into the teaching/learning process. More recently, Dr. SchWeber has been writing about resilience, when confronted by disaster or unexpected developments. Her research originally focused on organizational resilience, such as what happened after Hurricane Katrina. Her interest in resilience actually goes back to her own roots as an immigrant (from France) and what she learned about the adaptability to changing conditions of her parents and others. In addition to professional activities, she is active in her community, as co-chair of the social action committee of her religious organization (which has 12 ongoing hands on community programs!), as an interviewer for Servas, an international host program, as a Board member of OSE-USA, an organization that saved children's lives—including her mother—during WWII and pioneered community health care and as a volunteer mediator in the District of Columbia.

Steven Rathgeb Smith is the Waldemar A. Nielsen Chair in Philanthropy at the Public Policy Institute at Georgetown University. He is on leave from the Evans School of Public Affairs at the University of Washington where he is the Nancy Bell Evans Professor of Public Affairs and director of the Nancy Bell Evans Center on Nonprofits & Philanthropy. Dr. Smith was the editor of *Nonprofit and Voluntary Sector Quarterly* (NVSQ), the journal of the Association for Research on Nonprofit Organizations and Voluntary Action (ARNOVA) from 1998-2004. From 2006-2008, he was also president of ARNOVA. His publications include *Nonprofits for Hire: The Welfare State in the Age of Contracting* (with Michael Lipsky), *Public Policy for Democracy* (with Helen Ingram), and most recently, "Foundations and Public Policy," in *American Foundations*, published in March 2010 by Brookings Press.

Rosalind Swenson is Director of the Office of Academic Exchanges at the Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA). Previously, Ms. Swenson served as Deputy Director of the Office of Academic Exchanges and Assistance Coordinator in the Office of Eastern Europe and NIS Affairs at ECA. Ms. Swenson began her career as a foreign service officer in Yaoundé, Cameroon; Saigon, Vietnam; Athens, Greece; and Washington, D.C. Ms. Swenson then joined the civil service and

became Cultural/Media Coordinator for the Office of European Affairs. Ms. Swenson is a graduate of Goucher College and the Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs.

Jeanne Maddox Toungara is an Associate Professor of History at Howard University, where she teaches courses on West Africa, the African Diaspora and Women in Africa. Her research interests and publications in peer-reviewed journals include topics on West African intellectual history, political culture, and democratization within francophone African nations, with particular emphasis on Côte d'Ivoire. She is completing a monograph on political culture in the northwestern region.

Dr. Toungara is the recipient of several study and research awards, including the Ford Foundation Doctoral Fellowship, the National Endowment for the Humanities, Fulbright-Hays Program, the Ministry for National Education in Côte d'Ivoire, and the West African Research Association. She has presented academic papers at the annual and conferences held in the United States and abroad. As an invited international lecturer, she has given presentations for the Office of Public Diplomacy and Public Affairs (U.S. State Department) in France, Niger, Chad, Côte d'Ivoire and Benin. She has also served as a Public Member for the State Department's Foreign Service promotions panels. In June 2000, she was awarded a grant by the US Institute for Peace to train 15 African women in the gender studies, conflict management and peace building. Her collaboration with the British Embassy led to two symposia and a co-authored white paper on Women's Empowerment. From 2002 – 2004, she chaired the Dean's Task Force on International Affairs that developed a proposal for a new major and minor program in international studies for the College of Arts and Sciences. She is an alumna of two Salzburg programs: Seminar 419 on International Educational Exchange and Mobility (2004) and the Freeman Seminar (2005). Dr. Toungara is the Fulbright representative for Howard University and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Frances Villagran-Glover is the Acting Dean of Students at Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA) - Alexandria Campus. As the chief student services officer for the campus, Ms. Villagran-Glover oversees enrollment management, outreach, financial aid, counseling, advising, veteran affairs services and student life programs. Ms. Villagran-Glover works with faculty, staff and community stakeholders in helping students navigate the college experience through engagement, leadership and service.

Lucy Vitaliti is the Coordinator of the Office of Volunteerism and Service Learning at Montgomery College, Takoma Park/Silver Spring campus, where she has directed a Learn and Serve national grant, and the college's service learning program since 2005 expanding it to all three campuses. Dr. Vitaliti works with faculty, staff, community partners and students that hail from around the world.

Kathleen Maas Weigert is the Executive Director of the Center for Social Justice Research, Teaching and Service at Georgetown University, created in January 2001 when Dr. Maas Weigert joined the University as the first director. She is a Research Professor in both the Department of Sociology and the Program on Justice & Peace.

Dr. Maas Weigert received the B.A. and M.A. in International Relations from the University of Minnesota, and the Ph.D. in Sociology from the University of Notre Dame. She has lectured, facilitated workshops, taught and published on such topics as experiential and community-based learning, nonviolence, and education for justice and peace. She is the co-designer of Notre Dame's "Concentration in Peace Studies," the first concentration (now called interdisciplinary minor) approved in the College of Arts and Letters (1983) as well as co-designer of the Notre Dame's "Concentration in Catholic Social Tradition" (1998). She is the co-designer of the "Social Justice Analysis" concentration in the Sociology major at Georgetown (2004). A co-editor of *America's Working Poor* (University of Notre Dame Press, 1995), she is also one of the authors of *The Search for*

Common Ground: What Unites and Divides Catholic Americans (Our Sunday Visitor, 1997), which received the “1998 Award for Excellence in Research” from the National Conference of Catechetical Leaders. She is co-editor of Teaching for Justice: Concepts and Models for Service-Learning in Peace Studies (American Association of Higher Education, 1999) and Living the Catholic Social Tradition: Cases and Commentary (Sheed and Ward, 2005). She is currently working on social justice ideas in the work of Jane Addams.

Dr. Maas Weigert is a co-recipient of the University of Notre Dame’s 1991 Grenville Clark Award, which is given for “voluntary activities advancing the cause of peace and human rights.” In 1997 the national Peace Studies Association gave her its award “in recognition of her steadfast commitment to the development of Peace Studies.” She was one of the ten finalists selected for the national Campus Compact’s 1999 Thomas Ehrlich Faculty Award for Service-Learning. In the spring of 2000 she received the University of Notre Dame’s Reinhold Niebuhr Award which is given to one “whose life and writings promote or exemplify the area of social justice in modern life.” She serves on the boards of CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) and the Jesuit Social Research Institute at Loyola University, New Orleans.

Molly Young is the Director of Youth Opportunities at the National 4-H Council, where she manages the national citizenship and leadership opportunities for young people at the National 4-H Youth Conference Center. The Citizenship Washington Focus and Wonders of Washington programs provide educational opportunities for young people across the country to learn about leadership and citizenship through the living classroom of Washington, DC. Prior to her work at National 4-H Council, Molly worked for BoardSource, providing consulting and training resources for nonprofit boards of directors on governance issues. She graduated from DePauw University, with a BS in Communications and Political Science and from the University of Nebraska with an MS in Family, Youth and Child Studies. Molly has studied abroad in Mexico and Cuba, working with underserved youth populations in both countries.
