A BRIEF HISTORY

- Established in 1946 by Congress, Fulbright is the United States government's **flagship international educational and cultural exchange program**.
- Fulbright is **sponsored by the U.S. Department of State** with funding provided by the U.S. Government and administered by the Institute of International Education.





Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, & Accessibility

Funding Reasonable Accommodations

- The U.S. State Department and cooperating agency staff are committed to providing reasonable accommodations.
- Disability-related accommodations are intended to remove barriers and provide equal access.
- If accommodations have costs, this does not reduce participant grants/stipend amounts; if costs are high, cost-sharing is between program partners.
- Specifics of what is needed is case by case, so discuss this early with Fulbright staff to give them time for planning with you and partners.

While you are applying

- Plan early
- Ask questions
 - Does the host have an accessible office, library, lab space, and housing?
 - Ask for all options – on campus and in-community
 - Are there workarounds? What is possible?
 - Does my host country have the necessary accommodations and/or materials for me?
- Choose your host institution carefully
- Make sure you have a strong point of contact who can help/assist
- Be specific in project statement about how you will conduct your project
- Regarding your medical care, consider countries with robust healthcare systems
- Connect with Fulbright Scholar alums and/or Fulbright Commission staff about the in-country experience





Before departure

- Plan early
- Speak with Program Management about the additional State Department funding
- Continue to ask questions during the Pre-Departure Orientation
- Continue to communicate with your host institution(s) about your needs
- Continue to communicate with the Fulbright Commission or U.S. Embassy Post about your needs
- If selected, complete the medical form thoroughly
- Consider what you need to pack





During your grant

- Upon arrival, begin networking with colleagues and discussing your needs
- Continue to communicate with your host institution(s) about your needs
- Continue to communicate with the Fulbright Commission or U.S. Embassy Post about your needs
- Ask colleagues about other individuals with disabilities who can provide advice and insight
- Address problems immediately and create workarounds if necessary
- Make the most of your Fulbright experience!

- Iceland Awards
 - Funding is available for US Fulbright Scholars to Iceland with a disability, be it a structural or functional impairment or activity/participation limitation, that entails additional costs that are not covered specifically through the Fulbright Program. Some funding may be available for a wide range of disabilities including, for example, hearing, vision or movement impairment. The funding could, for example, be used to assist with specialized housing needs, in-country transport, or specialized assistance. The extra funding amount will depend on need and will be decided by the Commission after consultation with the Scholar.





Fulbrighters with Disabilities

- Fulbrighters with Disabilities offers a limited range of tangible services, including the following:
 - Proofreading/providing feedback on applications for grants, fellowships, and scholarships (Fulbright, Rhodes, Chevening, etc.) for applicants with disabilities;
 - Connecting Fulbright scholars with disabilities (and family members who're traveling with them) with resources and accommodations in their host countries and institutions;
 - Hosting educational sessions about the UN CRPD, laws governing disability rights and accessibility in various host countries, and strategies for securing reasonable accommodations under the appropriate laws;
 - Providing professional consultations to recent university graduates with disabilities who're seeking employment.
