

## Fulbright Program

The Fulbright Program is the U.S. government's flagship international educational exchange program and is designed to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries. Established in 1946 under legislation introduced by U.S. Senator J. William Fulbright, the Fulbright Program provides participants—chosen for their academic merit and leadership potential—with the opportunity to study, teach and conduct research, exchange ideas, and contribute to finding solutions to shared international concerns. The Fulbright Program operates in over 160 countries worldwide. Approximately 8,000 grants are awarded annually.

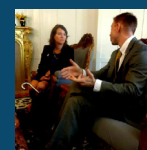
### Core Fulbright Program

The core Fulbright Scholar Program sends 800 U.S. faculty and professionals abroad each year. Opportunities are available in over 125 countries for college and university faculty and administrators as well as for professionals, artists, journalists, scientists, lawyers, independent scholars and many others. In addition to several new program models designed to meet the changing needs of U.S. academics and professionals, Fulbright is offering more opportunities for flexible, multi-country grants.



### Fulbright Arctic Initiative

This initiative brings together a network of scholars, professionals and applied researchers from the United States, Canada, Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, Russia and Sweden for a series of three seminar meetings and a Fulbright exchange experience. Scholars complete multidisciplinary research in one of two themed working groups: resilient communities and sustainable economies.



### Fulbright Public Policy Fellowship

The Fulbright Public Policy Fellowship (FPPF) provides opportunities for U.S. early and mid-career professionals and practitioners to serve in professional placements in a foreign government ministry or institution in partner governments around the world. Fellows build mutual understanding and contribute to strengthening the public sector while cultivating public policy experience in their desired area of expertise. The FPPF also includes an independent research component that focuses on an issue that is beneficial for the host ministry and the Fellow.



### International Education Administrator Seminars

The Fulbright International Education Administrators (IEA) Seminar Program offers fully-funded grants for U.S. higher education administrators to participate in an intensive two-week seminar abroad to learn about other countries' higher education systems. Seminar participants develop new perspectives and insights for improving internationalization opportunities on their campus.

While each seminar will have specific eligibility requirements, opportunities are available for:

- Foreign student advisors, study abroad advisors, and foreign student admissions officers
- Deans, vice presidents, presidents, provosts and directors
- Career services, alumni affairs, and development officers

The Fulbright Scholar Liaison Network is a community of administrators, faculty, professionals and Fulbright program alumni at higher education organizations across the United States. Liaisons work across the full spectrum of academe and serve as the main point of contact for the Fulbright Scholar Program with the American higher education community.

### Scholar-in-Residence Program

Through the Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence (S-I-R) Program, U.S. colleges and universities collaborate with scholars from other countries to assist in internationalizing U.S. campuses, curriculum and communities.

Fulbright Scholars-in-Residence teach primarily on the undergraduate level in their areas of expertise and provide a cross-cultural or international perspective to promote curriculum and program development. Their activities typically contribute to enhancing the institution's global studies programs, interdisciplinary course/program offerings and broaden international cooperation. In addition, Scholars-in-Residence are expected to engage in both on-campus and community activities throughout the program's duration.

**Eligibility:** Any accredited U.S. institution of higher learning is eligible to apply, but preference is given to Minority Serving Institutions, small liberal arts colleges and community colleges.

### Fulbright Enrichment Program

The Enrichment Program offers a variety of enrichment activities in different locations throughout the academic year for current Fulbright Visiting Scholars. These activities are designed to enable scholars to better experience America and to further the Fulbright Program's goal of increasing mutual understanding between the people of the U.S. and people of other countries.

### Outreach Lecturing Fund

The Outreach Lecturing Fund (OLF) provides funding for campuses to host Fulbright Visiting Scholars, who are already in the United States, for short-term speaking engagements. Special consideration is given to campuses that have not previously participated in the Fulbright Scholar Program.

The OLF is a travel grant that facilitates short term (two to six days) campus visits by scholars to:

- Share their specific research interests
- Exchange ideas with U.S. students, faculty and community organizations
- Speak on the history and culture of their countries
- Create linkages between their home and host institutions
- Become better acquainted with U.S. higher education

In addition to programming the visit, institutions are asked to cover the following costs for the scholar: local transportation, lodging and meals.
